Where young people are identified the CSP are continuing to reach out and offer appropriate support to prevent re- offending. Training was delivered to over 60 professionals in June by St Giles Trust. This training focused on Child Criminal Exploitation and Youth Violence. It gave professionals better understanding on the topic and what more we can do as a partnership to prevent it happening to young people. Additionally, SfYP continues to offer Social Inclusion Work Shops in Woodhall and Hatfield. Herts Police are identifying those know to be Habitual Knife Carriers and alongside partners are working with those individuals to reduce the risk to them and members of the public.
